## Coral Reef Commons: Status and Some Proposed Responses Dennis Olle

Miami Blue Past President Dennis Olle will bring us up to date on the endangered pineland tract near Metrozoo. So little of our native pine forest is left: only 2 per cent in Miami-Dade County. If built, a proposed shopping mall and housing development will fragment the largest remnant of this critical habitat outside Everglades National Park. Dennis has been involved in the coalition to stop this destruction.

While no longer our president, Dennis has stayed involved as Director of Conservation Programs for our Chapter. and serves as a national director for NABA.

# **Butterflies of the Florida Keys Susan Kolterman**

### NABA MEMBER'S MEETING
