Conservation, Faunal Changes, and the Exchange of Butterflies Between Cuba and Florida
Marc Minno

Gainesville zoologist Marc Minno specializes in the study of South Florida and Florida Keys butterflies, and has written a number of books many of us have in our personal leps libraries, such as *Florida Butterfly Caterpillars and their Host Plants*. His PowerPoint talk will conclude with a Q&A session. His occasional presentations to Miami Blue are always informative and enjoyable--not to be missed.

Bonus talk and speaker: **Butterflies of Cuba Douglas Fernandez** 

Cuba is one of the world's hot spots for biodiversity. A significant percentage of the island's plants and

animals are unique to Cuba, including Leps.

Douglas Fernandez is one of the top naturalists in Cuba. Douglas has published a number of articles on Cuban butterflies and contributed a chapter on their biology to the book, *Lepidópteros de Cuba*. He is currently working on field guides to Cuban butterflies and wildflowers.
